

MOULTRIE WIRES HELD TO ATLANTA

Thomasville Favors Gate City as Second Choice for Regional Reserve Bank for This District.

Harrison Jones and A. B. Simms, representing the joint committee of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and the Atlanta Clearing House association in south Georgia and Florida in the campaign for getting a regional reserve bank for Atlanta, on Wednesday wired the Atlanta joint committee more encouraging news.

Measures Jones and Simms wired that all of the Moultrie banks, the Moultrie Board of Trade and the mayor of Moultrie had unanimously endorsed Atlanta.

In a second message they stated that while Thomasville had already endorsed Savannah, that city had made Atlanta its next choice should Savannah be found out of the running.

The endorsement of Atlanta by the Brunswick Clearing House, which was made a week ago, was followed on Wednesday by a strong endorsement from the Brunswick Board of Trade.

The language of the Brunswick Board of Trade is very strong in that it says that the best interests of the south, particularly the southeast, are best served by the regional reserve bank.

Pedestrians along Pryor street, near Hunter, were thrown into a semi-panic late Wednesday afternoon when the body of Edward Parker, a painter, fell from the fourth floor of the building, on a scaffold, suddenly missed his footing and with a shriek, heard by his fellow workers, fell fully ninety feet to the hard-packed earth near the Pryor street sidewalk.

When turned over, Parker was found to be unconscious. The ambulance was hurriedly called, and Parker was taken to the Grady hospital.

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THREE ARE ARRESTED ON CONSPIRACY CHARGE

Isadore Block Charged With Conspiring to Conceal Assets of Alleged Bankrupt.

Charging that he had conspired with G. Constancy, an alleged bankrupt merchant of Atlanta, doing business at 38-40 West Mitchell street, to conceal from H. A. Ferris trustee named by Judge Newman of the United States court, assets of the alleged bankrupt, Isadore Block was yesterday arrested upon a warrant issued by United States Commissioner Carter and was held in a \$1,000 bond to appear before the federal grand jury.

Constancy's creditors filed with the clerk of the federal court last December a petition for bankruptcy proceedings, and H. A. Ferris was named by Judge Newman to take charge of the alleged bankrupt's estate.

Ferris failed to discover the assets Constancy had declared. An official inquiry, in which search warrants figured, brought into his possession a large amount of the missing assets.

Trustee Ferris asked Commissioner Carter for a warrant for the arrest of Isadore Block, charging conspiracy with G. Constancy, the alleged bankrupt, to conceal his assets from the trustee.

Isadore Block, a merchant doing business on West Mitchell street, against whom involuntary proceedings in bankruptcy were filed in December by P. Fligman, charged with conspiring to conceal from Trustee Ferris the assets of Shmoff the alleged bankrupt. Both Shmoff and Fligman made bonds, each in the same sum, before Commissioner Carter.

Like warrants were served on P. M. Shmoff, a merchant doing business on West Mitchell street, against whom involuntary proceedings in bankruptcy were filed in December by P. Fligman, charged with conspiring to conceal from Trustee Ferris the assets of Shmoff the alleged bankrupt.
