Not less than 2 nor more than 7 years after the date of this declaration you may file a petition for naturalization (or second papers). To file such petition it will be necessary for you to make application, in person or by letter, to the nearest clerk of court exercising naturalization jurisdiction, or to a representative of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, for an application Form A-2214. You should not delay doing this until near the close of the 7-year period, because if you do not file your petition with the court prior to the expiration of this 7-year period it will be necessary for you to file a new declaration of intention and wait at least another 2 years thereafter before you can file your petition for naturalization. If you should marry a citizen of the United States, a declaration of intention is not required as a basis for filing your petition for naturalization.
