### FREDERICK FINKENBERG

Frederick Finkenberg of 50 West Ninety-sixth Street, an operator in Harlem and Bronx real estate and a retired furniture dealer, died yesterday at the age of 74 in the Memorial Hospital, where he had been a patient for four weeks.

With three of his brothers he was a partner in the furniture firm of A. Finkenberg's Sons, Third Avenue and 124th Street, for forty-five years until the sale of the business in 1949.

In 1912, as a member of the Harlem Board of Trade, Mr. Finkenberg sponsored a plan for the construction of a bridge to link Manhattan, the Bronx and Queens. Years later he was a member of the Citizens Committee at the opening of the Triborough Bridge. He was a Mason and a member of the Free Sons of Israel and the Infants Welfare League.

Surviving are his widow, the former Hilda Rosenthal; four brothers, Israel, Edward, Leo and Mortimer, and a sister, Mrs. Ernestine Isaacs.
