

Irving Sartorius, Broker, Dead; Limited Partner in Firm Here

Irving A. Sartorius, a limited partner in the Stock Exchange firm of Sartorius & Co., 39 Broadway, died yesterday in Beekman-Downtown Hospital after a brief illness. He was 65 years old and lived in Easton, Conn.

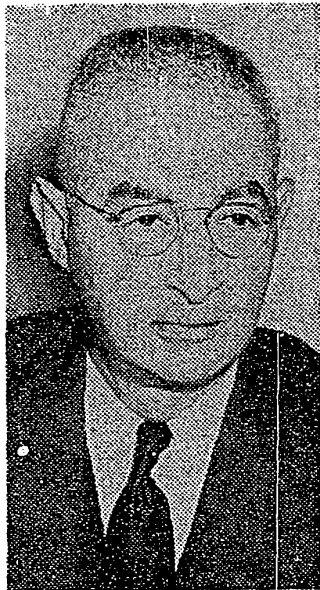
A former treasurer and member of the board of regents of the Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn, Mr. Sartorius was a member of the Easton-Redding Regional High School Board of Education. He formerly had been a member of the Easton Board of Education.

After a career as a free-lance broker, Mr. Sartorius became in 1918 a partner in Sartorius, Smith & Loewi. The firm had been founded in 1899 as A. Sartorius, went through various name changes and is listed now as Sartorius & Co.

Mr. Sartorius, a member of the Stock Exchange from 1916 to 1933, was a partner in the firm until 1941, at which time he became a limited partner. He received a B. S. degree from Yale in 1914.

An Army lieutenant in World War I, Mr. Sartorius served in both the Pacific and Atlantic theatres as a Coast Guard lieutenant in World War II. He was a yachtsman, belonged to the New Bedford (Mass.) Yacht Club and took part in races from Newport, R. I., to Bermuda.

In Easton, Mr. Sartorius had raised Aberdeen Angus cattle and belonged to the Connecticut Aberdeen Angus Breeders Association. He was a member also of the Yale, Stock Ex-

change Luncheon, Regency and Cavendish Clubs here and the Century Country Club, White Plains.

His first wife, Mrs. Edythe Carr Sartorius, died. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Joan Cady Sartorius; four daughters, Mrs. Judith Seixas, Mrs. Brenda Engel, and the Misses Deirdre and Tara Sartorius; four sons, Herbert, Fenimore, Jorian and Noren; a sister, Mrs. Bertha Magnus, and seven grandchildren.
