Death occurred to Mr. Groenwoldt, a life long resident of Scott county and a well-known farmer, this morning at 2:45 o'clock at his home, one-half mile west of Summit school house.

Mr. Groenwoldt was born Dec. 19, 1871, on the same homestead where his death occurred. He was a member of the Farmers Union and was very active in all activities of that organization. Practically he belonged to Pluto lodge, No. 118, K. of P. of Eldridge, and the American Society or Equity.

On Jan. 28, 1895, he was united in marriage to Miss Matilda Pelesler at Davenport and the couple immediately made their home on the Groenwoldt homestead. Besides his wife he is survived by one son, Elmer J. at home; two daughters, Mrs. Herbert Waetke of Davenport, and Mrs. John Doerscher, Davenport, Ill. He has three sisters, Mrs. John Kloppenburg, Hartley, Iowa, and Mrs. Albert Leblum, and Mrs. Meta Meyer, both of Davenport, and three grandchildren.

The body will be taken from the Runge mortuary to the late home for funeral services to be held there at 1 p. m. Monday, thence to Pine Hill cemetery for interment.

RABBI BARON TO TALK TONIGHT ON KAUFMANN KOHLER

"Dr. Kaufmann Kohler" will be the subject of a memorial address by Rabbi Joseph L. Baron at Tri-City Temple Emanuel, Brady and Eleventh streets, Davenport, this evening at 8:00 o'clock.

Dr. Kaufmann Kohler, one of the foremost Jewish scholars in America, passed away in New York two weeks ago in his 82 year. He was the president of the Hebrew Union College at Cincinnati for 18 years. The graduating class of 1920, of which Rabbi Baron was a member, was the last to be ordained by him. Dr. Kohler was one of the leading authorities in the critical study of both the Old and New Testaments. He was the author of many outstanding works, notably a popular and detailed "Jewish Theology." His last published work was "Heaven and Hell in Comparative Religion, with Particular Reference to Dante's Divine Comedy." His book, entitled "The Synagogue and Church, Their Origin and Mutual Relations." The usual Sabbath eve service will precede the lecture. The public is cordially invited.
